Using paradoxical thinking helps me.

Some paradoxes to ponder:

- I'm saving it for good. This is as good as it gets.
- Live today as if it were your last day. Live as though you will live

forever.

- To be a success, you must seek failure.
- Everything is important. Ultimately nothing matters.
- To do something well, you must do it poorly.

What does holding a paradox in your mind have to do with walking our talk?

Embracing paradoxes, holding differing ideas in my mind, has helped me embrace my gifts and my failures...all in the same moment.

When I can embrace paradoxes I also find myself being friendly with error. In myself and in others.

Paradoxical thinking has helped me let my life speak. This is as good as it gets!

Paradoxical thinking has helped me love my life--the good, the bad, the ugly.

Be Kind

The sign in the gift shop read:

Good judgment comes from experience. Experience comes from bad judgment.

You don't have to be right. Try being kind instead. - Wayne Dyer

I discovered in the big picture of my life, with my relationships with others, it was more important to be kind.

Being kind would get me to "right" faster than anything I'd experienced.

I could effect change faster with kindness than trying to be right.

When I focused on kindness, I found I could make mistakes and learn faster from those mistakes.

When I focused on kindness, I forgave myself.
